

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

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
BASW England 80:20 Campaign for relationship based social work

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BASW England 80:20 Campaign for relationship based social work

 Social workers need enough time to work with families to achieve good outcomes- families staying together

 Social workers are frustrated that they are spending too much time on administration tasks, instead of direct relationship-based work with children and families.

• Therapeutic, reflective, relationship-based practice is the best way for social workers to bring effective and positive change to children and families.





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

An Ethic of Care - key concepts

- Recognition of need and vulnerability.
- Significance of *relationality*.
- Theorising in this area highlights how *interdependence* and *reciprocity* characterise all human interactions.
- Embraces *diversity* and an awareness of *power relations* between caregiver and care-receiver, from which notions of rights and citizenship are developed.

Nel Noddings and Joan Tronto




Emphasises the *interdependence and reciprocity* of the carer and cared-for persons and *relationality*.

Elements of care (Tronto)

- Attentiveness
- Responsibility
- Competence
- Responsiveness

Caring and Social Justice – an ethic of care moves from small scale of relationships to concerns about wider social issues (eg Tronto and Noddings).

Kadushin Supervision Triangle (1976)



The relationship can be thought of as a triangle because unless all sides are present it collapses.







How it started

AUSTERITY:

Funding for children's and young people's services has fallen by 23% since 2010 - £2.2 billion less

How it's going

LAs spent £136 million more on children's social care March-July 21 due to COVID-19.

As LAs launch consultations on their 2021/22 budgets, it's clear they are seeking savings in children's services.




Uncertainties about risk, always possible to get it wrong


85% of social workers assaulted, harassed or verbally abused, but 70% of these not investigated - 'threatened with weapons, verbally abused, stabbed, held hostage, harassed in the street ...hot drinks thrown on them. Some had to move house or leave their jobs due to persistent abuse... a failure on the part of many employers to take prevention seriously, or to respond properly when incidents do happen'



Previous unpredictable and unsafe experiences makes families feel unsafe


SW role and task can make them feel frightened or powerless




Use of self, requiring reflection upon personal experience and intuitive as well as conscious self-awareness

Firm boundaries and flexibility/ availability important


Uninterrupted time is required: establish a safe and relaxed environment, prepare for the work and reflect on it afterwards




A facilitating environment for direct work with children (Lefevre, 2022)








FIG 2 Multimodal compassionate mind training: the key aspects and attributes of compassion (inner ring) and the skills training required to develop them (outer ring). From Gilbert (2009) with permission of Constable and Robinson.





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
